2024 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- 11 girls and women are currently on scholarship.
- 5 communities had weekly children's programs currently serving 52 children
- 7 girls had eye exams and 2 received glasses
- Workshops were funded for both the cooperative members and for the girls who are receiving scholarships
- The remodeling of the women's center is complete. It includes a second floor, more sleeping rooms, another bathroom and increased light and air flow throughout. It is really beautiful!
- A women's literacy program is taking place in Zinacantan

Mujeres is in a wind down mode and we only solicited donations to support the girls on scholarship. We are assuring that scholarship recipients will be able to complete their academic careers and working toward making the children's programs self-sustainable. Other programs will continue as we are able. We are so grateful to all our donors as our stable financial situation is due to them.

Our Mission Statement

We are dedicated to partnering with and empowering indigenous women in Chiapas, Mexico, by providing them with access to education. Our goal is to help break the cycle of poverty, build self-esteem, and create positive role models.

YEAR IN REVIEW

2024 was our 19th year in existence.

We are delighted with the progress of the scholarship recipients. Among the 5 girls at the university level, one is in pre-school education, another in nursing, two study law, and one is in administration. They have all been on scholarship with us since the 6th grade!

The children's programs, run by scholarship recipients as their community service obligation, continue to thrive.

Profile of the Indigenous Women of Chiapas

The women with whom we partner are indigenous Maya who speak Tsotsil, Tzeltal, and Tojolabal. About 50% speak Spanish, their second language, well. They live in extreme poverty. Many have dirt floors and rudimentary latrines. 39.2% of the general indigenous population is illiterate while illiteracy of indigenous women is estimated at 50% or higher. Girls, in particular, are unable to attend school for many reasons: having to work to sustain the family; deferring education to males in the family; lacking funds to cover educational expenses; and continuing long-standing traditional roles of a woman in the culture. What We Do Mujeres de Maiz Opportunity Foundation, founded in 2006, partners with an indigenous seamstress and weaving cooperative (established in 1996). We provide access to education in the form of scholarships, workshops, Saturday children's programs, laptop computers, and eye exams and glasses. The women assess their own needs, develop programs and make proposals to us, which we fund as we are able. In addition, in the past few years, we have funded a women's center in San Cristóbal de las Casas, funded a government accredited literacy program in a rural community for 6 years, and provided 20 eco-friendly latrines to 20 families.

Who We Are We are a small grassroots organization with a working Board of Directors. Until Covid, we held a "Men with Guitars" concert and a Mexican breakfast as part of our fundraising. Funds are solicited from our individual donors only once a year. We are a 501(c)(3) organization.

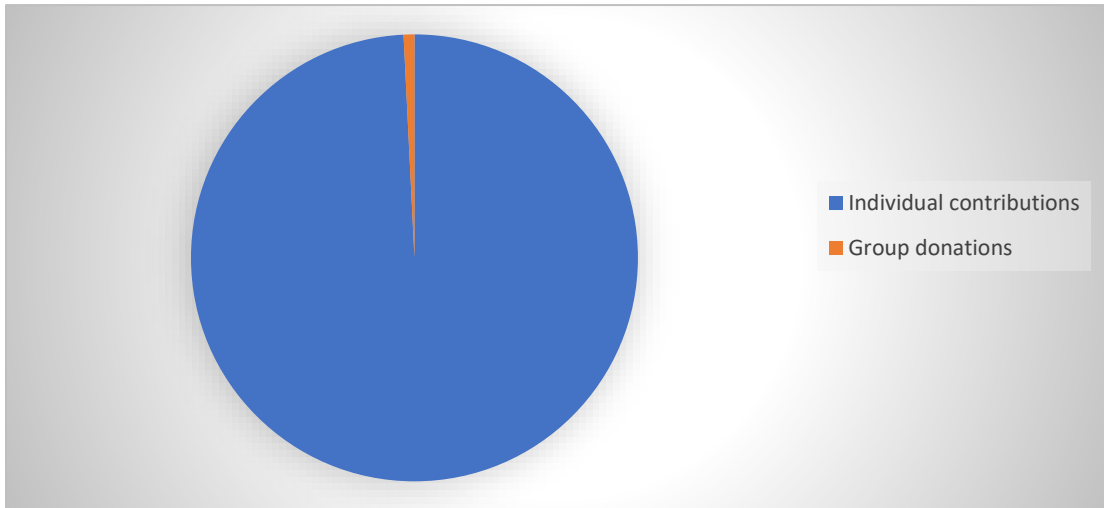


Cooperative members April 2024
